shed (n.) <i>Stone Fox</i> p. 16	a small, simple building for storage or shelter	Dad said I could use the old shed in our backyard as a clubhouse.
trek (v./n.) <i>Swiss Family</i> p. 32	to travel with hardship; a difficult journey	Few people survive the dangerous trek up Mt. Everest. (n.)
envious (adj.) <i>Pilgrim Boy</i> p. 27	jealous	I was envious of my best friend because he received a new bike for his birthday.
represent (v.) <i>Stone Fox</i> p. 43	to stand for; take the place of	The Statue of Liberty represents freedom.
mischief (n.) <i>Pilgrim Boy</i> p. 45	naughty or bad behavior	Mom trusted my brother and me to not get into any mischief when she went to the store.
cringe (v.) <i>Swiss Family</i> p. 65	to shrink back in fear	We cringed as we watched Mom's new dish fall to the floor.
position (v.) <i>Stone Fox</i> p. 65	to put something in place or to arrange something	Please position the vase of flowers in the center of the table.
interpret (v.) <i>Pilgrim Boy</i> p. 81	to explain the meaning or importance of	As we were learning Roman numerals, our teacher interpreted what each symbol meant.
pry (v.) <i>Swiss Family</i> p. 122	to lift off or open by pushing with a tool such as a screw driver	Mr. Smith had to use a screwdriver to pry the lid off the jar.
